PROFILE OF THE COLLEGE

Established on 6th day of September 1979, Dera Natung Government College with its erstwhile name 'Government College, Itanagar' aimed at imparting higher education to young and inquisitive minds of the state at a point of time when the opportunity was scarce in the state. The founders had an ambitious endeavour not merely to make it a centre for offering Degrees but also to let the youths explore new areas of knowledge, providing a platform for budding leadership in all walks of life, preparing the youths for future challenges in personal and social spheres and grooming them as competent human resources, who, in turn, could promote the high social ideals such as equality, social justice, communal harmony and cultural plurality and other vital objectives of this college.

The college initially functioned from Govt. Higher Secondary School building, Itanagar, and fulfilled the educational aspirations of a few ambitious students with four departments viz. English, Hindi, Economics and History in the evening shift. In 1986, it was relocated to its present sprawling campus with a huge Administrative and Academic Block and continued both in the night and the day shifts till 1990 when the night shift was finally done away with. Since then, the college has progressed in leaps and bounds in terms of

infrastructure, student strength, faculty position, impressive student performance and academic research. The college has been assessed and accredited by NAAC, Bangalore, for 3 cycles consecutively.

During its 45 years of glorious existence, the college community consisting of students, faculty members, non-teaching staff and of course the college authorities have been working towards the fulfilment of these ideals and goals and presently it remains one of the premier institutes of Higher Education in the State with a legacy of excellence in teaching and learning process. The college was re-christened as **DERA NATUNG GOVERNMENT COLLEGE** in the session 2001-02 to commemorate the remarkable contributions of the visionary and illustrious leader, late Dera Natung, who served as one of the finest and most dynamic Education Ministers thriving for all round development of education in the State.

The College has presently 4568 students enrolled in three streams viz Arts, Science and Commerce, comprising of 14 departments. There are 89 highly qualified and dedicated faculty members and 31 competent non-teaching staff working tirelessly for the growth of the institution. The college has a well-stocked library with more than 40000 titles with a reading hall for students and designated chambers for the teachers. A big play ground with an open stadium developed under UGC fund provides ample facilities to students to nurture their skills in games and sports, athletic activities and other events for development of recreational and healthy environment in the campus. An Auditorium in the heart of the college facilitates the cultural, literary and indoor sports events besides providing ample space to conduct awareness programme, counselling, workshop, seminar, etc. The college has a Computer Centre and IT Cell which imparts absolutely free computer education on various courses. A fully digital Language Lab set up under RUSA scheme helps the students sharpen their listening and speaking skills.

The Coaching for Entry in Services Cell of the college imparts coaching to APST students for entry into various services. The coaching is held for numerous competitive examinations with special focus on civil services and banking recruitment examinations. The Counselling Cell creates awareness among the students regarding potential career opportunities. A Remedial Coaching Centre takes care of the economically and educationally backward students by providing coaching to improve their standard. The college has well equipped NCC wings and NSS units which groom and guide students to imbibe spirit of discipline, unity, patriotism and social responsibilities. The cadets and volunteers serve the nation in various spheres with confidence and pride.

GENERAL INFORMATION

For the academic year 2025-26, admission to all UG Programs of the College of Dera Natung Govt. College, Itanagar will be done on the basis of Common University Entrance Test (Undergraduate) - 2025 (CUET(UG)-2025).

1. CUET (UG)-2025 is conducted by the National Testing Agency (NTA). The candidate may note that the role of NTA is limited to the conduct of CUET (UG)-2025, declaration of results, and handling of queries related to the entrance examination. Simply appearing in CUET (UG)-2025 will not be a sufficient condition to secure a seat in the college. For admission to a course, a candidate must apply online admission-2025.
2. The online admission-2025 will serve as a single window for admission to all UG programs of the College. All candidates desirous of taking admission to a course/programme should apply only through online admission-2025. Only the admissions processed and granted through the official online platform of the college will be considered valid.
3. Before initiating the application process, the candidates are advised to read the prospectus carefully.
4. Determination of eligibility and verification of documents for admission to a course/programme will be the sole purview of the college.
5. Preference shall be given to those candidates who have secured good percentile in CUET (UG) 2025.
6. Those students who have not appeared in CUET (UG) 2025 may also be considered on merit basis/through entrance test as per RGU/Govt. guidelines only if vacancies exist after allowing admission to all those applicants who qualified CUET (UG) 2025.
7. Seat allocation to all UG Programs will be based solely on the scores obtained in CUET (UG)-2025, subject to fulfilment of Program-specific eligibility criteria.
8. For allocation of seats in Performance-based/ Sports Proficiency-based/ Practical-based Programs, and a combined score of CUET (UG)-2025 and Performance Tests/Sports Trials/Practical test and/or certificates will be considered.
9. Candidates are advised to check college website (www.dngc.ac.in) for all communications and updates related to admissions.
10. DNGC will not be responsible for a candidate's lack of awareness of the admission guidelines, schedule, eligibility criteria, and other relevant rules as approved by the State Govt. from time to time. It is the sole responsibility of the candidate to keep checking the college website regularly.
11. In case of non-compliance with the requirements for admission, including non-submission of relevant documents and/or non-payment of Fees within the stipulated date and time, the candidate will lose his/her right to admission.
12. The selected candidates are required to appear in person to verify the original documents as and when notified by the University/College.
13. It is the sole responsibility of the candidate to prove his/her eligibility for claiming reservation under any of the reserved categories (including PwBD and Orphan). Candidates applying under SC/ST/OBC /PwBD/ Orphan categories will be required to upload the certificates/documents of the respective reserved category/sub-category issued by the Competent Issuing Authority.

14. If at any stage, documents submitted by the candidate relating to the admission are found to be fake/non-genuine and/or fabricated or in any other manner defective, the said candidate will not be given admission. If already admitted, admission will be cancelled without any prior notice in this regard. If the same is found after completing the Program, his/her degree will be revoked and appropriate legal action will be taken.
15. A candidate's participation in the admission process will be provisional. If, at any stage, it is found that eligibility requirements are not fulfilled, the admission, if granted, shall be cancelled *ipso facto* and appropriate legal action will be taken against such candidate. College will not refund admission fee (if paid) in case a candidate is found ineligible at any stage.
- The College reserves the right to cancel the admission of any candidate who violates the rules and regulations laid down by the college from time to time.

B.A. Semester-I

- i. Out of **1400** seats, **936** seats are reserved for the students of **Catchment Area** strictly on merit basis with minimum of 40% marks secured in class XII.
Definition of Catchment Area for Arts Stream: Students permanently residing in the capital complex/ passing out from a school located in the capital complex/ students whose parents are employed in the capital complex belong to catchment area.
- ii. The remaining **464** seats are meant for students from Non-Catchment Area (different parts of the state)/ Open quota strictly on merit basis. **Students with minimum 55% marks in aggregate are eligible to apply under this category**

B.Com. Semester-I

- i. Out of total **200** seats, **160** seats are reserved for students from **Catchment Area** purely on merit basis with minimum 40% marks secured in class XII. **40** seats are reserved for students from Non-Catchment Area/Open quota with minimum 45% marks in class-XII.
- ii. Students must have passed class - XII with Commerce or Economics/ Mathematics/ Statistics as one of the subjects.

Definition of Catchment Area for Commerce Stream: Students permanently residing in the capital complex/ passing out from a school in the capital complex/ whose parents are employed in the capital complex, Students of Lower Subansiri, Keyi Panyor, Kamle, Kurung Kumey, Papum Pare and Kra Daadi districts.

B.Sc. Semester-I

- i. Out of total **300** seats, **240** seats are reserved for students from Catchment Area strictly on merit basis with minimum 40% marks secured in class XII. **60** seats are reserved for students from Non-Catchment Area/Open quota with minimum 60% marks in class-XII.

Definition of Catchment Area for Science Stream: Students permanently residing in the capital complex/ passing out from a school located in capital complex/ students, whose parents are employed in the capital complex/Students from Upper Subansiri, Lower Subansiri, Keyi Panyor, Kamle, Kurung Kumey, Kra Daadi, Papum Pare, East Kameng, Pakke Kessang, West Kameng & Tawang districts.

- Note:**
1. Students whose parents are residing at capital complex but have passed school from places other than capital complex, should submit employment certificate of the parent issued by their employer.
 2. Permanent Resident Certificate is to be produced wherever there is claim for permanent residence.



ADMISSION CRITERIA

- i. Candidates must have obtained the desired percentage as previously mentioned against each discipline (Arts/Commerce/Science) under catchment and non-catchment area and must have passed in English subject in class XII examination.
- ii. Candidates who have passed their class XII examination in the year 2025 from any recognised Board with ENGLISH as one of the subjects are eligible to apply. Cases of students who passed Class XII in 2024 may be considered subject to submission of gap certificate (declaring not admitted in any institute during last academic session) from the competent authority.
- iii. **Preference shall be given to those candidates who have secured good percentile in CUET (UG) 2025.**
- iv. **Those students who have not appeared in CUET (UG) 2025 may also be considered on merit basis/through entrance test as per RGU/Govt. guidelines only if vacancies exist after allowing admission to all those applicants who qualified CUET (UG) 2025.**
- v. The newly implemented NEP 2020 by RGU from 2023 onwards is a revised and newly structured curriculum where in a student of B.A./B. Sc./B. Com. Semester-I has to compulsorily study a total of **six papers** that includes one **Major Course (CC)**, one **Minor Course (MC)**, one **Multidisciplinary Course (MDC)**, one **Ability Enhancement Course (AEC)**, one **Skill Enhancement Course (SEC)**, and one **Value Added Course (VAC)**. The courses must be chosen by the student very carefully.
- vi. Two seats each are reserved for NCC and NSS volunteers on merit basis for which a certificate must be produced.
- vii. Two seats are reserved on sports quota. Meritorious athletes will be given preference.
- viii. Incomplete forms are liable to be rejected.
- ix. ***Candidates are advised to go through “common course components and subject combinations” (p. 18) before filling up the application form.***
- x. Subject combination selected by the candidate during the online form fill-up shall be deemed final. ***Under no circumstance, a student can change his/her subject combination.***
- xi. ***Submission of forms or obtaining a prospectus by an applicant does not ensure legal claim for admission in the college.***

2. On the home page click the tab for **Online Admission**.
3. Select the desired course B.A/B.Com./B.Sc. from the **Select Program** under the **Apply for Admission** tab.
4. Enter your mobile number and click **Send New OTP** (*Note: do not use the phone number of your parents or guardians. The same mobile number shall be used by the institution for communication till the completion of course*).
5. Enter the OTP received and click **Proceed** that will lead you to the online admission form.
6. After filling up all the necessary details in the form, Click **Next** button. A confirmation page will appear where in you must check all the details filled.
7. After verifying the details filled, click on **'I Accept'** and then on **Confirm** Button.
8. For completing the form, the applicant must pay the online application fee on the payment page by using Debit/Credit Card or Net Banking/UPI/GPay mode. There is no provision for offline payment of application fees.

HOSTEL ADMISSION

The College has limited hostel facilities both for Boys and Girls. The number of seats available for Boys is 86 in **Tai Bida** Boys' Hostel whereas for **Nyari Welley** Girls' Hostel, it is 140 seats. In view of the limited seats, the allotment shall be made on the basis of the following guidelines provided by the Govt. of Arunachal Pradesh.

- i. Hostel seats for both Boys and Girls shall be allotted to students of Semester-III and Semester-V only.
- ii. Application for Hostels shall be received simultaneously at the time of receiving application for college admission.
- iii. Hostel admission process will be notified later on.
- iv. To obtain a seat, a student must have secured minimum 50% Marks for Boys and 45% for Girls in the immediate lower examination. Only those who cleared all lower exams (without backlog) shall be eligible to apply for hostel seat.
- v. The selection shall be made purely on merit basis for the entire session.
- vi. In no case, seat allotted to a student can be transferred to another student.
- vii. The boarders are required to maintain strict discipline and abide by the rules of the hostels as prescribed by the College Authority from time to time. Every boarder shall have to submit an Undertaking to the effect prescribed by the College Authority.

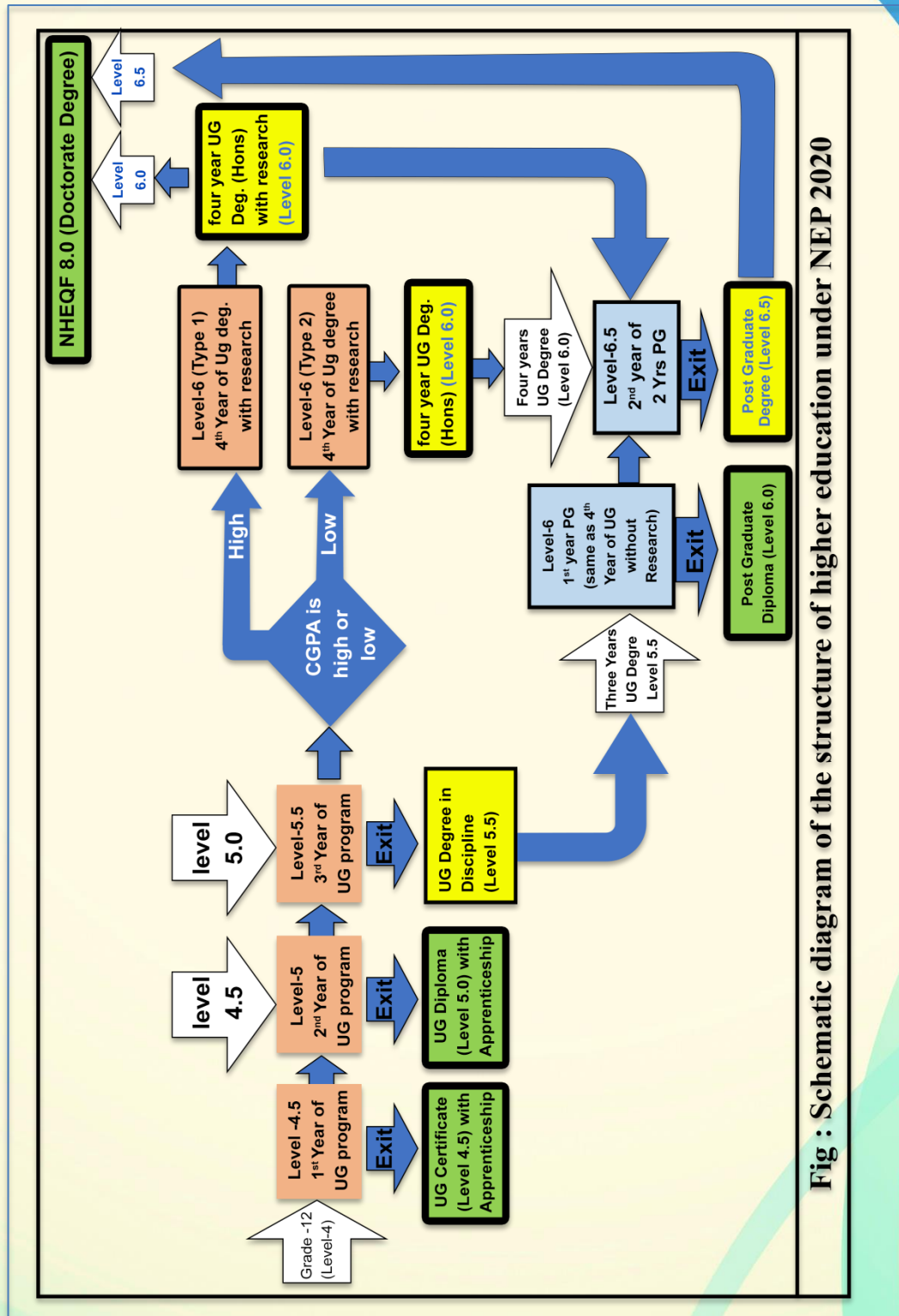


Fig : Schematic diagram of the structure of higher education under NEP 2020

EXAMINATION AND EVALUATION

End Semester examination and related information NEP 2020 (SEMESTER I, II, III, IV)

- i. The new curriculum under NEP 2020, implemented by RGU from the session 2023-24 onwards is a four-year degree programme that offers degree with honours/research after completion of four years that is categorically divided into eight semesters comprising four odd and four even semesters of 6 months duration each. However, the course also provides flexibility of multiple entry/exit during the course. The updated guidelines on the evaluation pattern of the entire course of NEP shall be notified by RGU shortly.
- ii. Admit Cards will be issued to the students in the preceding week of the University Exams.
- iii. **Internal assessment:** In every semester, there shall be **three** Sessional Test (Internal Assessments) for 20 % Marks and 80 % Marks for the End-Semester examination in each paper. It is compulsory for every student to secure a minimum of 40% marks in at least two Internal Assessments individually to be eligible to fill up the forms for End-Semester Examination.
- iv. **Attendance requirement:** It is mandatory to appear and to pass in Sessional Tests besides attending minimum 75% classes to be eligible to fill up the university Examination forms.
- v. **Tutorials and Class tests:** Tutorial is an important teaching-learning tool. It helps learners enhance their cognitive, affective, and psychomotor domains of behaviour.

- (g) Creating/ spreading hatred, ill-will or intolerance on religious, regional or communal grounds.
- (h) Causing disruption in any manner in the academic functioning.
- (i) Violation of prohibition norms of Ragging as per the Acts.
- (j) Violation of any of the above-mentioned acts of indiscipline may lead to initiation of appropriate action by the college authority which is as follows –
 - a) Expulsion/ Rustication from the college
 - b) Filing of FIR and legal action.
 - c) Compensation/ fine on physical damages.
 - d) Debarred from appearing in examination.

N.B. - The Principal shall have the authority to exercise all such disciplinary powers over the students in the college as may be necessary for proper conduct of the institution.
